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THE TRAP

Trap – noun -

Dictionary.com defines it, in part, thusly;

1. A contrivance used for catching game or other animals, as a mechanical device that springs shut suddenly.

2. Any device, stratagem, trick, or the like for catching a person unawares.

THE TRAP

As I define them, traps are built to ensnare, hold, maim, even kill. The purpose of a trap is to capture the prey until the one who sets the trap returns to either keep its victim in captivity or to hold the victim in place while life drains from its body.

I recall traps I've seen in movies that were set to capture tigers and the like for purposes of keeping them for exhibition and profit. Other traps I've seen depicted were to slow down an enemy by wounding them. Still other traps were designed to inflict mortal wounds. Some expediently and others with longer lasting, more painful death.

In John 10:10 it states that we too face an enemy. One who has come to steal, kill and

destroy. Some traps are meant to ensnare us for public display and profit such as the Ashley Madison trap. The kingdom of darkness fully exhibited and indeed profited in its purposes by this lurid trap. Destruction has been the end of many ministers caught in this particular trap. Still other traps set out to wound. How many wounded people do you know? They've been wounded by betrayal, family, church, etc. These wounds, unless properly treated, are sore spots that cause violent reactions when someone gets too close. These traps are designed to steal our joy and the abundant life Jesus promised in John 10:10. Yet other traps are set by the enemy of our souls to kill, to drain the life right out of us. You may have read of at least one minister who took his own life over the Ashley Madison exposure. While not always a literal death, how many visions, destinies

and promises die because Christian leaders fall prey to the snares of our enemy?

There is one trap that I'd like to warn you about. The trap of self-pity. It was following the fall of a great leader that I had to get alone with God and ask what happened. If it happened to him it could happen to me. In that earnest time before the Lord I heard these words, "Self pity will let you justify anything." The longer I serve the Lord the more I've seen this prove to be truth. It is amazing to me how subtle this trap works but how devastating its results.

Think about it. "They don't pay me enough", so we justify cheating a little here and there. Nobody will know and besides God knows I deserve it. Or, "my spouse isn't

giving me the attention I deserve" and this person at work (or church) tells me how nice I smell, how nicely dressed I am or other words of flattery and before long the flirting turns to something never originally intended but the trap is sprung. Another deadly aspect of self pity is we can become so focused on ourselves and perceived or even real injustices, that we become ineffective in ministry. We get so focused on me and my needs. I can't see hurting people around me. Yet another side effect can be that no matter how much those around us try to minister to us and help us nothing is ever good enough. The end result of that is we become isolated and thereby easy prey.

To battle this trap, let's remind ourselves that our life is not our own. Whatever I do to make room for myself to get ahead I

have to keep doing to stay ahead. It would be wise to remember our lives are not our own and we need to die daily to ourself. **The key word is SELF pity. It's usually the enemy's trap to lure us into promoting, defending, and justifying SELF.** This my friend, is an effective tool of our enemy especially as it comes to those of us in ministry.

If you find yourself already ensnared, may I remind you that our help is in the name of the Lord as found in the words of David:

Psalm 124:1 A Song of degrees of David. If it had not been the LORD who was on our side, now may Israel say...

Psalm 124:2 If it had not been the LORD who was on our side, when men rose up against us:

Psalm 124:3 Then they had swallowed us up quick, when their wrath was kindled against us:

Psalm 124:4 Then the waters had overwhelmed us, the stream had gone over our soul:

Psalm 124:5 Then the proud waters had gone over our soul.

Psalm 124:6 Blessed be the LORD, who hath not given us as a prey to their teeth.

Psalm 124:7 Our soul is escaped as a bird out of the snare of the fowlers: the snare is broken, and we are escaped.

Psalm 124:8 Our help is in the name of the LORD, who made heaven and earth

MUCH LAND REMAINS

Joshua 13:1-7 (NLT) – ***“When Joshua was an old man, the Lord said to him, ‘You are growing old, and much land remains to be conquered.’ He goes on to list the territory that still needed to be conquered. Then at the end of verse 6 the Lord declares: ‘I myself will drive these people out of the land ahead of the Israelites. So be sure to give this land to Israel as a special possession, just as I have commanded you. Include all this territory as Israel’s possession when you divide this land among the nine tribes and the half-tribe of Manasseh.’”***

Joshua overthrew the ruling powers of Palestine, destroyed the kingdoms, defeated the armies, and captured the fortresses to such an extent as to give Israel a firm foothold in the country. But he did not exterminate the population from every portion of that territory which he distributed to the several tribes. Not all of the land had passed out of the hands of its actual possessors into the hands of Israel. And there were several nations—of whom the Philistines and Phœnicians were the chief—which he left entirely intact. The land had still to be conquered.

So much has been done prior to now but there is still much to be conquered. Thank the Lord for all of those who have been before us! Thank the Lord for all of the work they have done; but there is still more to be done.

There must be a dissatisfaction that remains in our spirits until we conquer the land that the Lord has given to us.

Notice the end of verse 6 and then verse 7: ***“I myself will drive these people out of the land ahead of the Israelites. So be sure to give this land to Israel as a special possession, just as I have commanded you. Include all this territory as Israel’s possession when you divide this land among the nine tribes and the half-tribe of Manasseh.”***

Even though Israel still had “much land to be possessed”, God promised Joshua that He would give it to them, so he should include the yet-unconquered territory in his division of the land. When God promises something, His children should respond as if He has already done it, because He has.

We have been given a challenge by our Presiding Bishop called **Arise 2033**. Part of that challenge is to reach 75% of the counties in the United States. To accomplish this great vision of 2033 we will need the power of the Holy Spirit.

One of the ways to reach into those counties is to recognize that we are Pentecostal!

What happened after Pentecost? The church did not stay

in an upper room waiting for another Pentecost. They went out into Jerusalem, Samaria, Judea and the utter most parts of the world.

Being filled with the Holy Spirit is who we are. Being Pentecostal is who we are. We still want and need the gifts of the Holy Spirit manifested among us. We still need men and women full of the Holy Spirit going in obedience to the Great Commission to take our sphere of influence for the glory of God. We have the finances, people and resources to finish the Great Commission if we would walk in obedience.



It is not the lack of ability but availability to do what God has called us to do. We must finish the task conquering the land—our part of South Carolina and North Carolina. To do this we must walk in obedience to His commands.

As David Platt says, “Every saved person this side of heaven owes the gospel to every unsaved person this side of hell.” If we call ourselves Christian then we are under obligation to tell people about Jesus. Our priority must be to reach the lost.

To reach the areas of South Carolina and North Carolina under our sphere of influence we must plant churches and create a pipeline of raising up new leaders.

We must begin by praying for laborers like never before. Jesus said “The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few; therefore pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest” (Luke 10:2). What we need is a spirit of release to come upon the people of the South Carolina Conference—to release finances and people into the harvest field.

We must also recognize people who are called and get them into the pipeline.

We must preach about the call of God and give people an opportunity to hear the voice of God and respond to that call.

Let’s work together to conquer the land the Lord has given to us, for there is much that remains.

There is much difference between the responsibility of pastoring a church and being a preacher. The stress brought on by problems in the church is a facet of ministry, I do not miss. I am aware these situations are a normal part of the ministry. After 47 years of pastoring, I find it strange I am not in active ministry anymore.

Retirement has many benefits. Elizabeth and I spend more time together and I am also able to spend more time with my daughters: Michelle and Beth, and my grandsons: Noah, Cross and Silas. Following my grandson's sports and school activities consumes much of mine and Elizabeth's time.

I am amazed at the way God is directing our lives in ministry. We have situations which occur on a daily basis where we are able to minister in many places. The Word of God is true, "The steps of a righteous man are ordered by God". I am staying somewhat busy with preaching engagements in the Native American and African-American churches and the Caucasian churches of other denominations. January through May of this year, I am assisting the First Baptist Church of Maxton during their pastoral search. I am looking forward to seeing my friends and enjoying good Christian fellowship at this year's Camp Meeting. Retirement is certainly different from a pastor's daily routine of hospital visits, personal home visitation, prayer time, sermon preparation, board meetings, etc. Retirement does not mean you have to just sit around the house and do nothing. There is plenty that needs to be done! Joyce says, "Legrande's busy cleaning up the yard, trimming the hedges, sharpening lawn mower blades, feeding the chickens and gathering the eggs, if he runs out of anything to do, he will take something apart and put it back together."

Retirement has allowed us to rekindle our family togetherness, which we missed; especially the last fifteen plus years of our ministry. Six of our seven grandchildren grew up, graduated from high school, began college or joined the military while we were pastoring churches. We were blessed to pastor churches during these years that encouraged us to spend time with our family as often as we liked. That was a blessing to us! Retirement does not mean



you lose the urge to preach, you just don't have the pulpit to do it as you're accustomed to. But, thank God for those pastors who open their pulpits on occasions to allow superannuated ministers the privilege to "shuck and shell a little corn, now and then."

Retirement is bitter-sweet. It's good to know you can sleep-in, if you wish. You don't have to be in a rush to get to the hospital in the middle of the night or the early morning hours for an emergency telephone call or any early morning surgery. Retirement means you miss the friendship and the fellowship of the congregation you have learned to love and to appreciate.

God has blessed us beyond words with a wealth of precious memories and hearts full of love for all the people we've been honored to pastor through the years. Thanks again for your love and support.


On October 27th, 2018, the Discipleship Ministries sponsored the Mark Potter Jr. Scholarship 5k and
